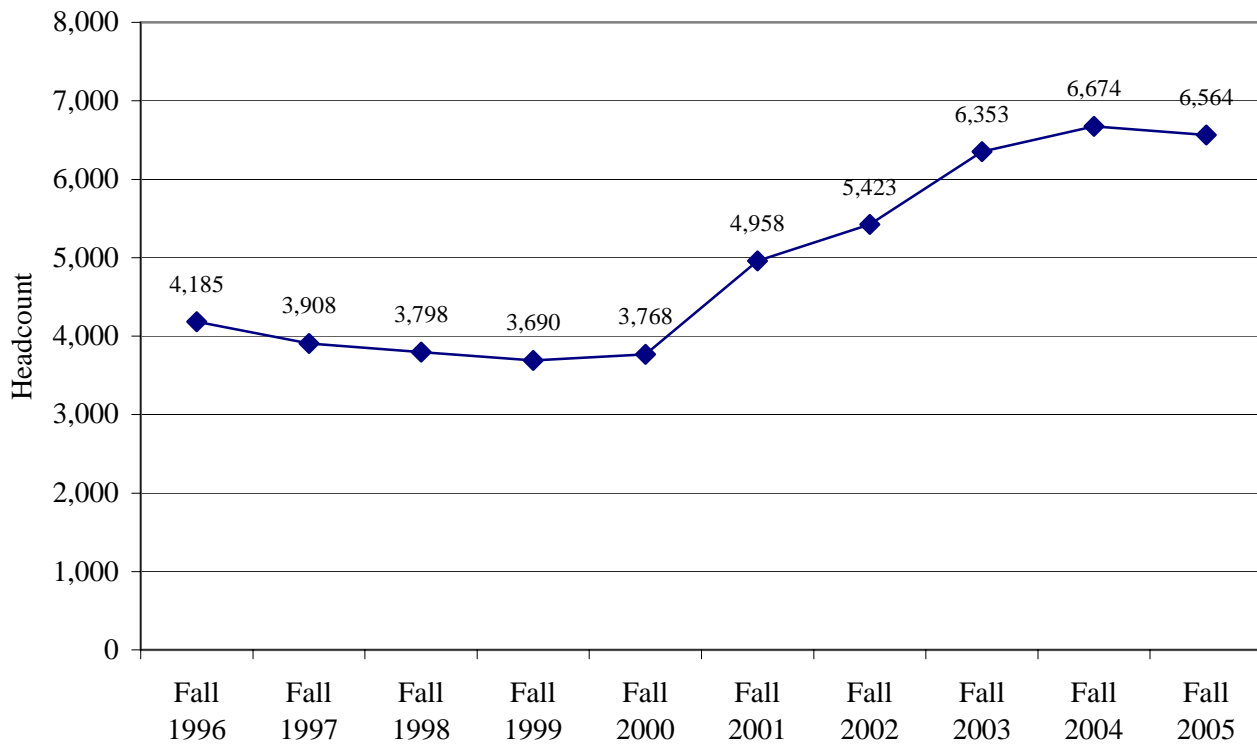

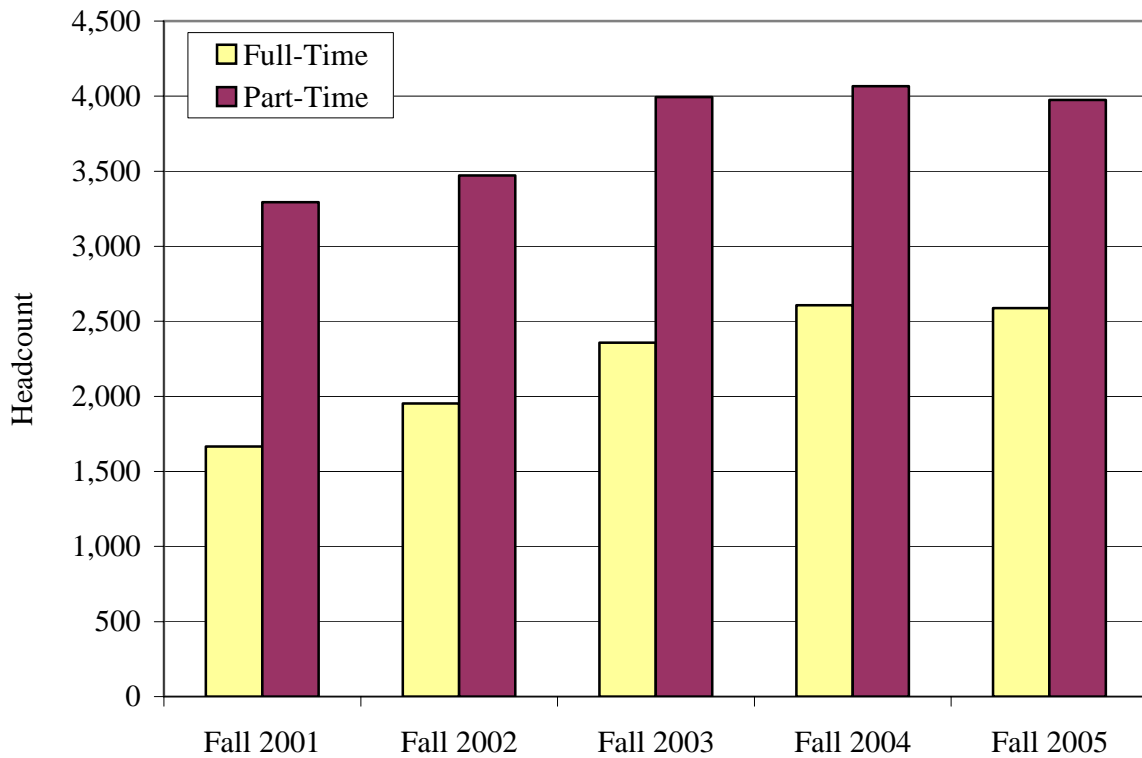

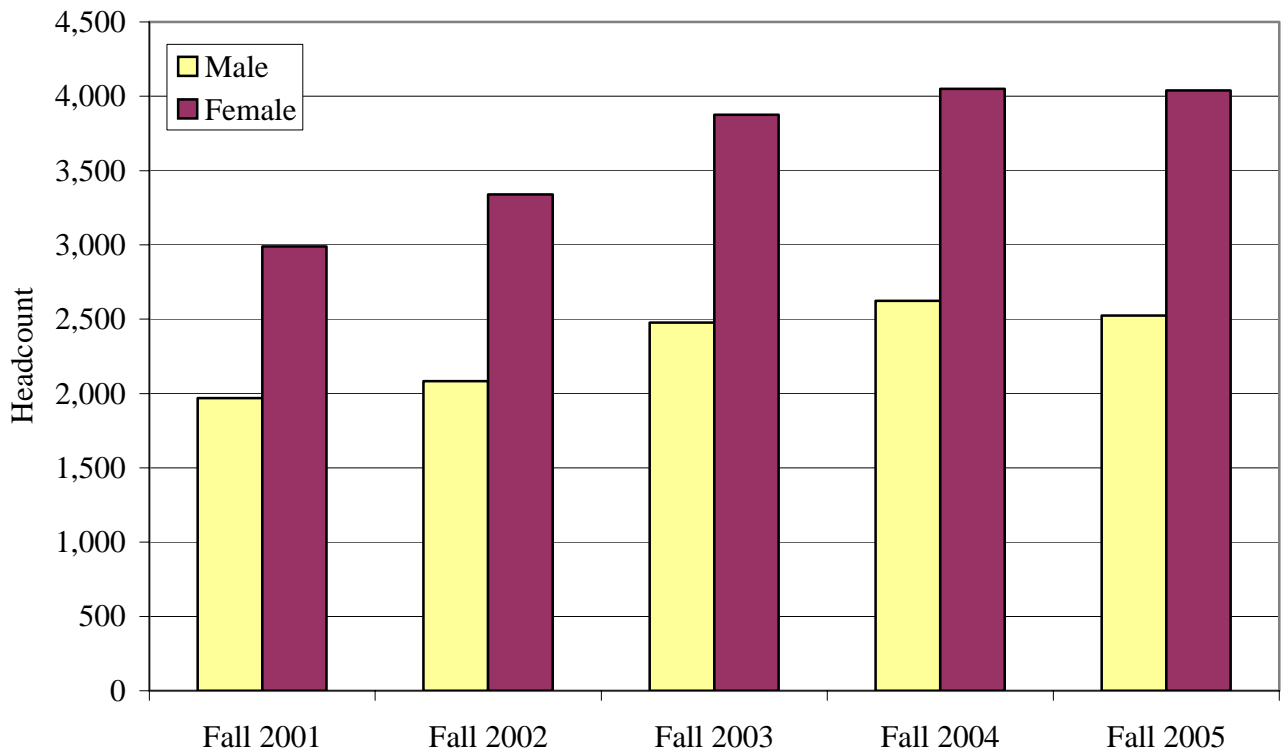
## CREDIT PROGRAM ENROLLMENT BY FULL-TIME OR PART-TIME STATUS

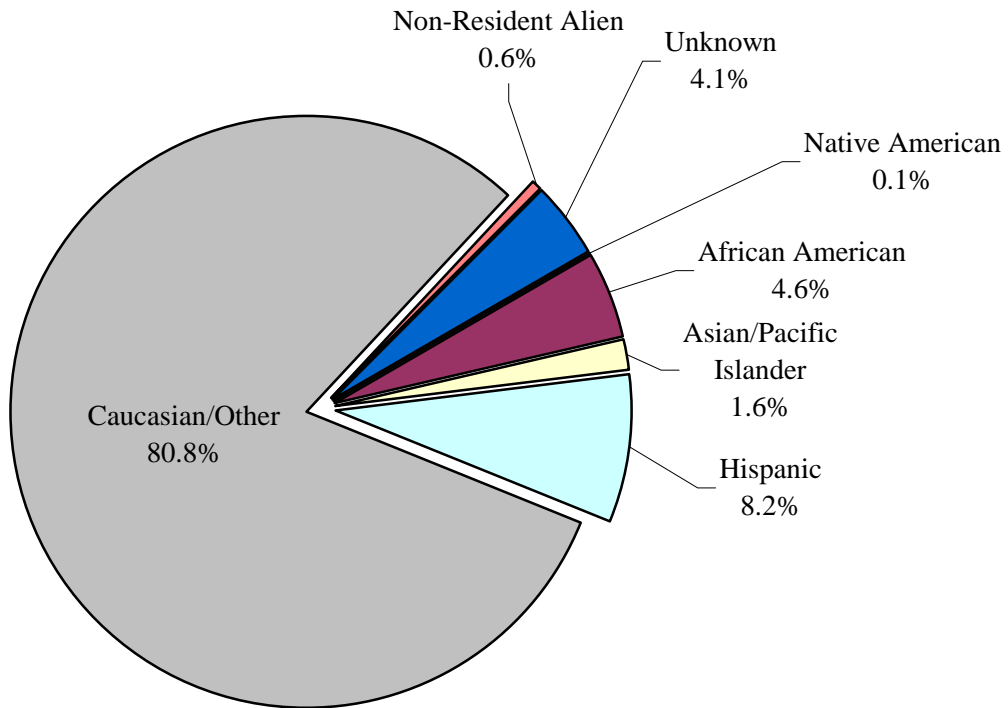
## CREDIT PROGRAM ENROLLMENT BY GENDER

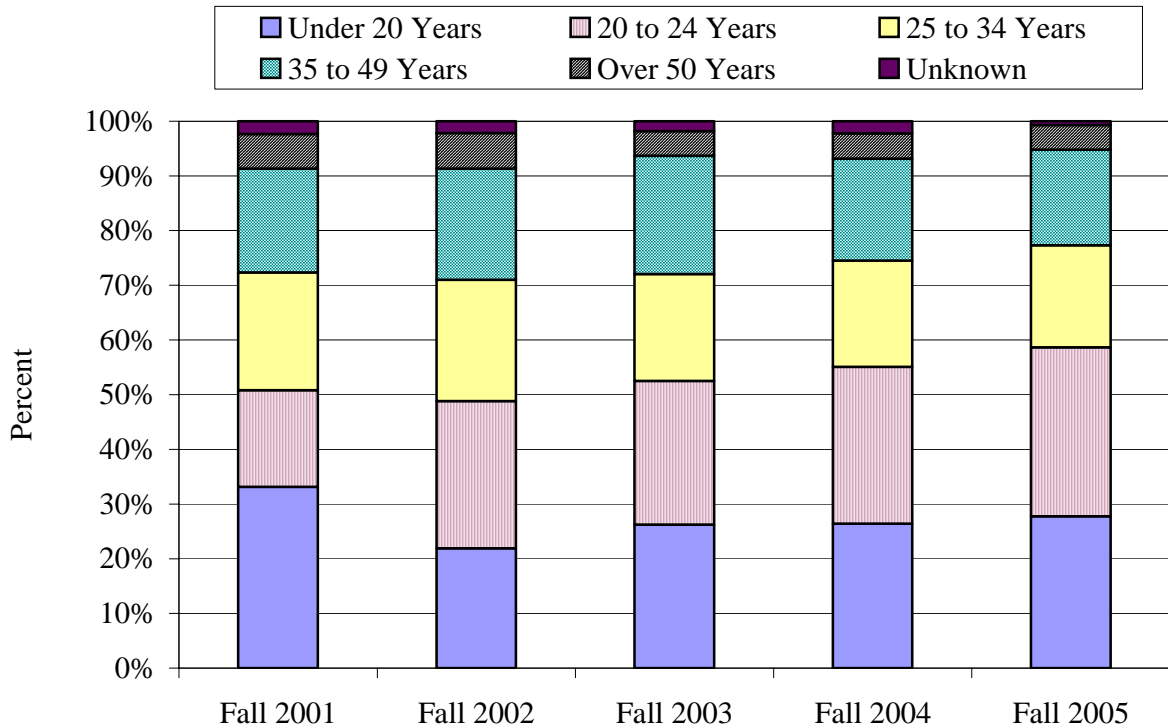

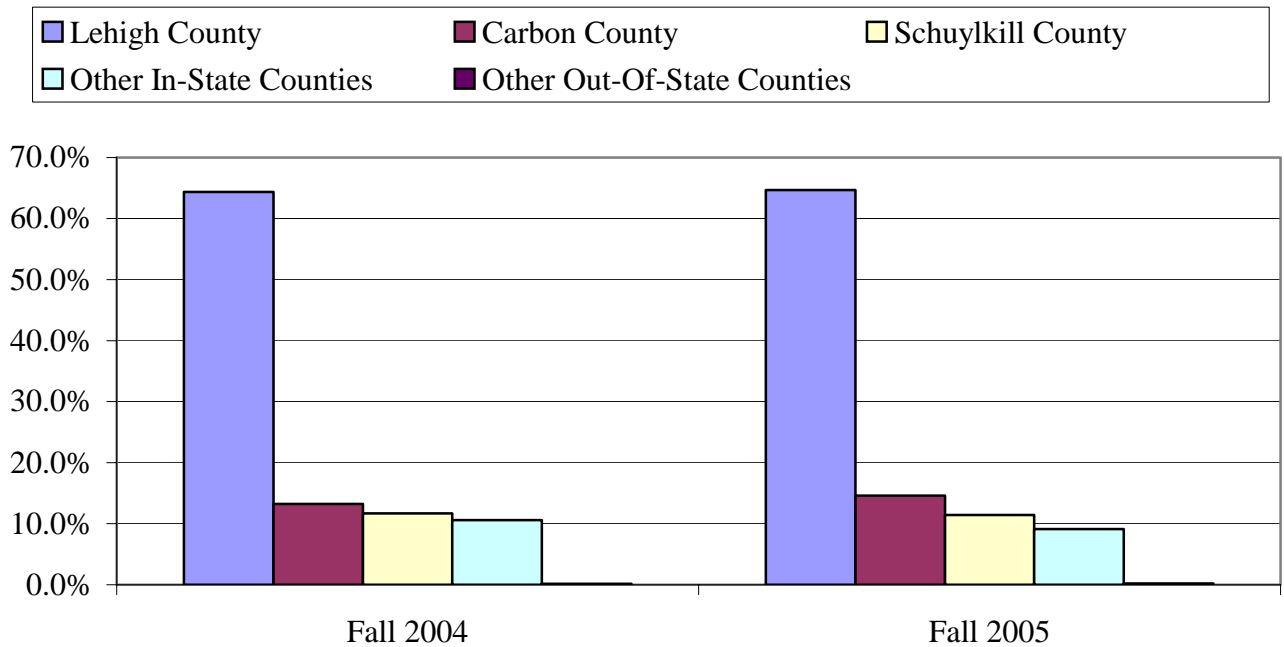

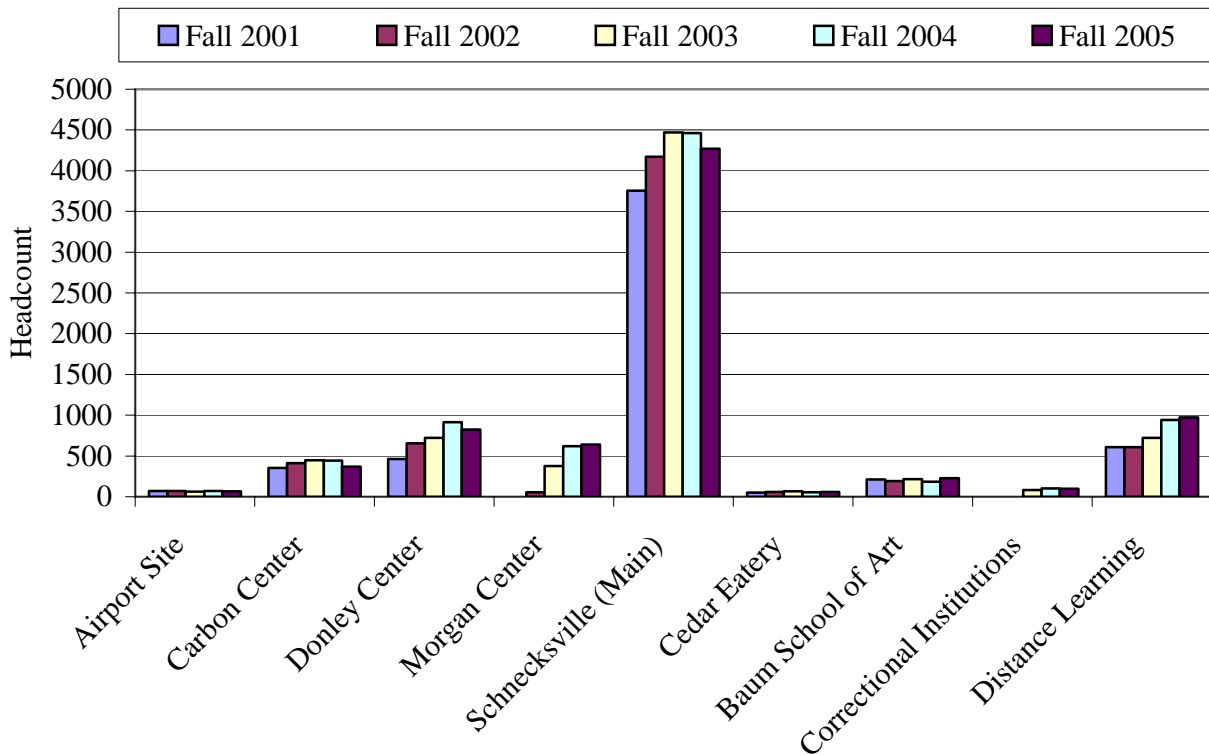
## CREDIT PROGRAM ENROLLMENT BY COUNTY OF RESIDENCE

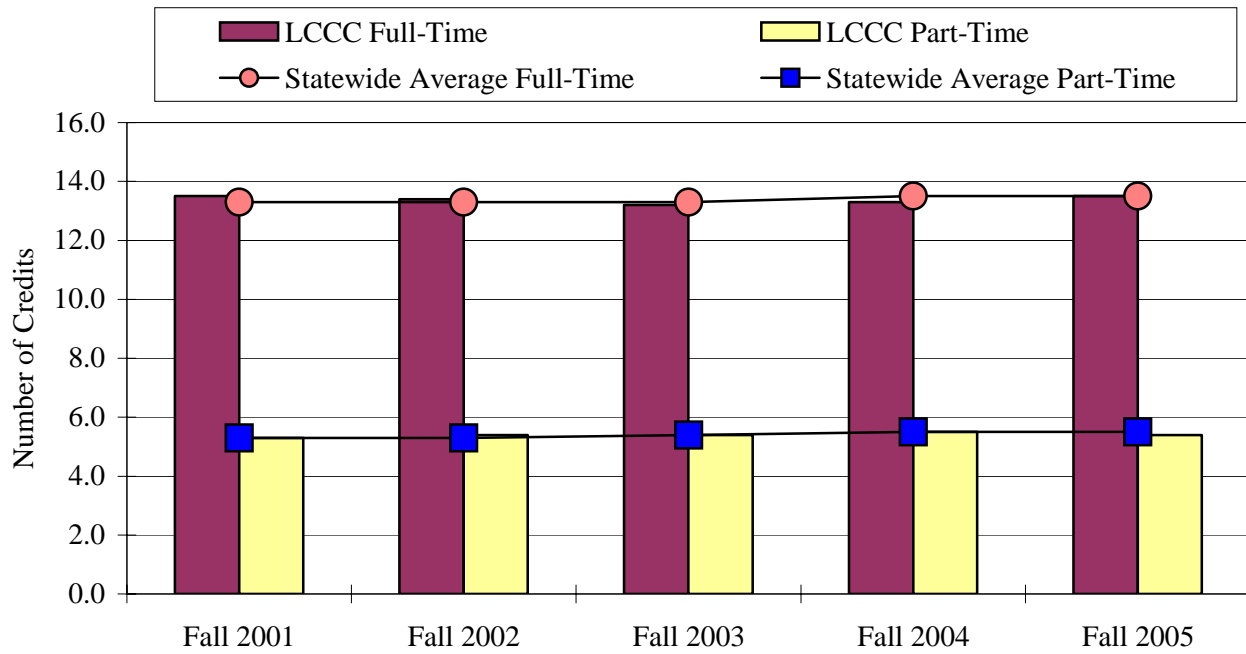

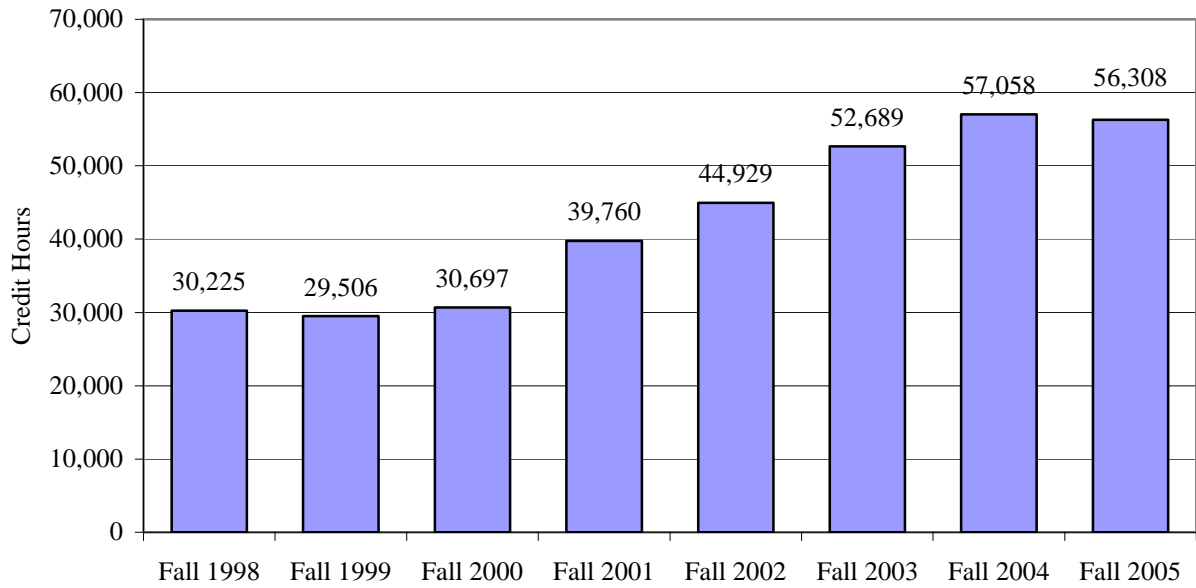
## AVERAGE NUMBER OF CREDITS ATTEMPTED



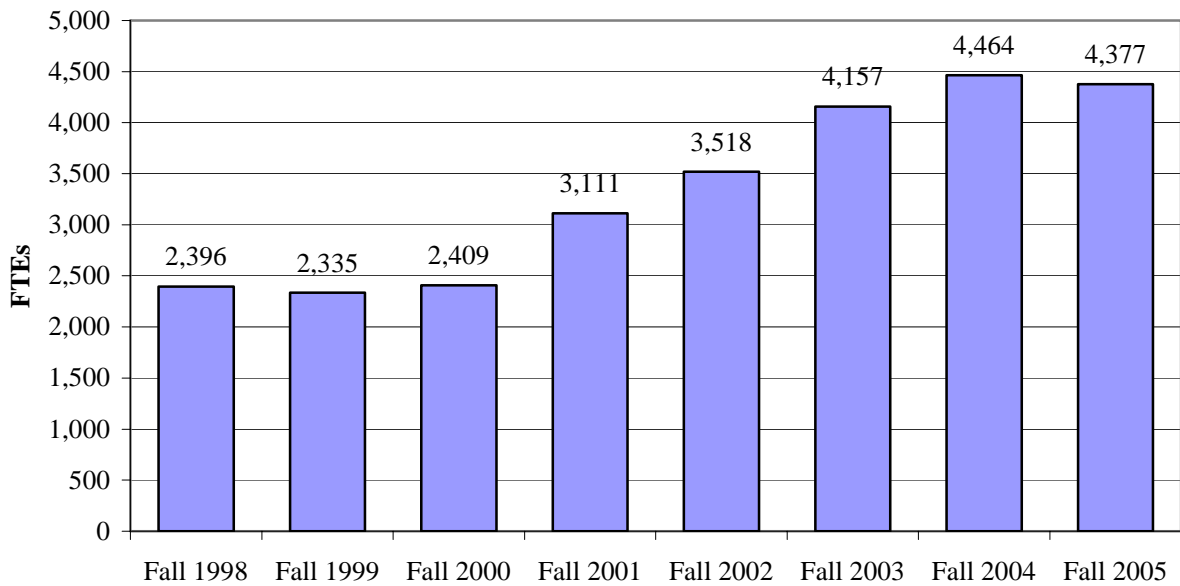

### FALL TERM CREDIT HOUR TOTALS

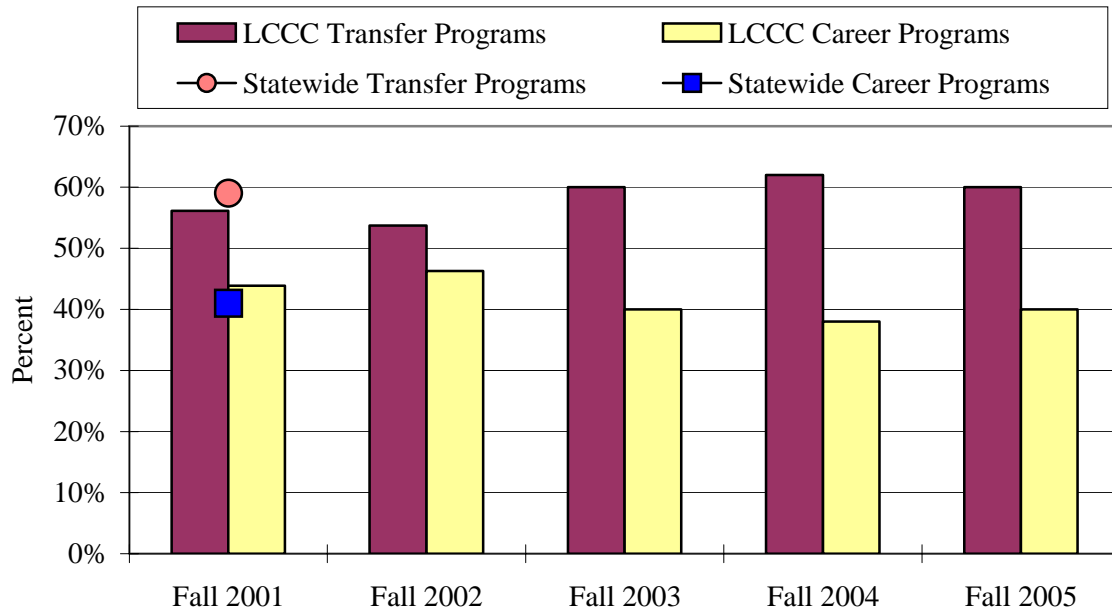


### FALL TERM FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) CALCULATIONS

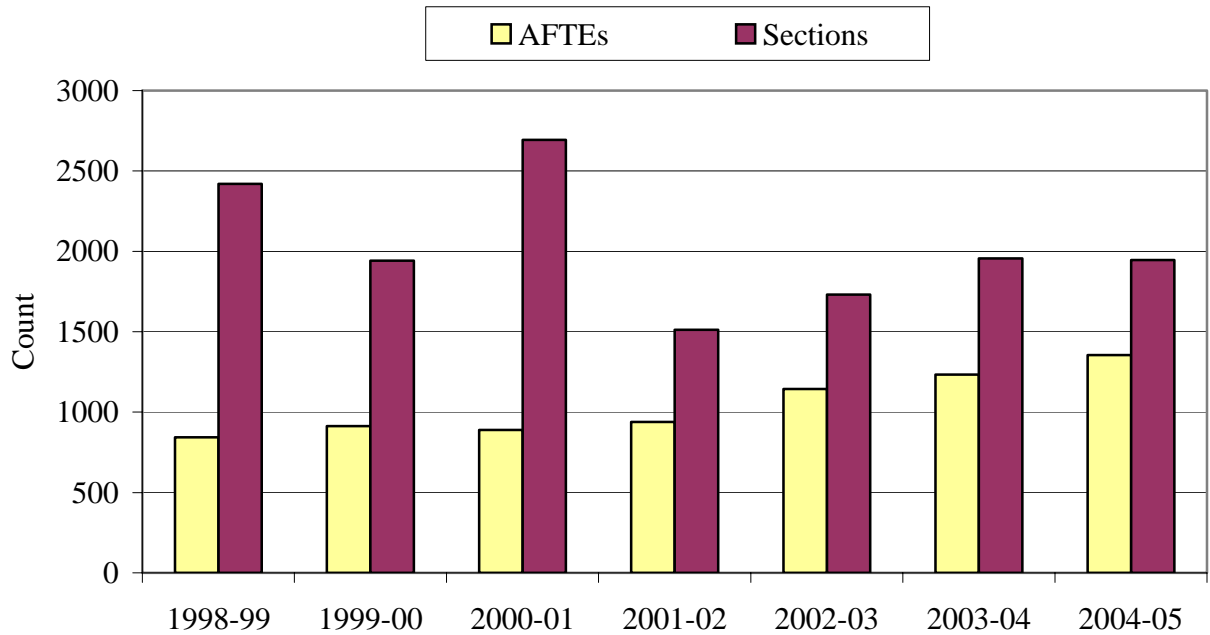
## NON-CREDIT ENROLLMENT HISTORY

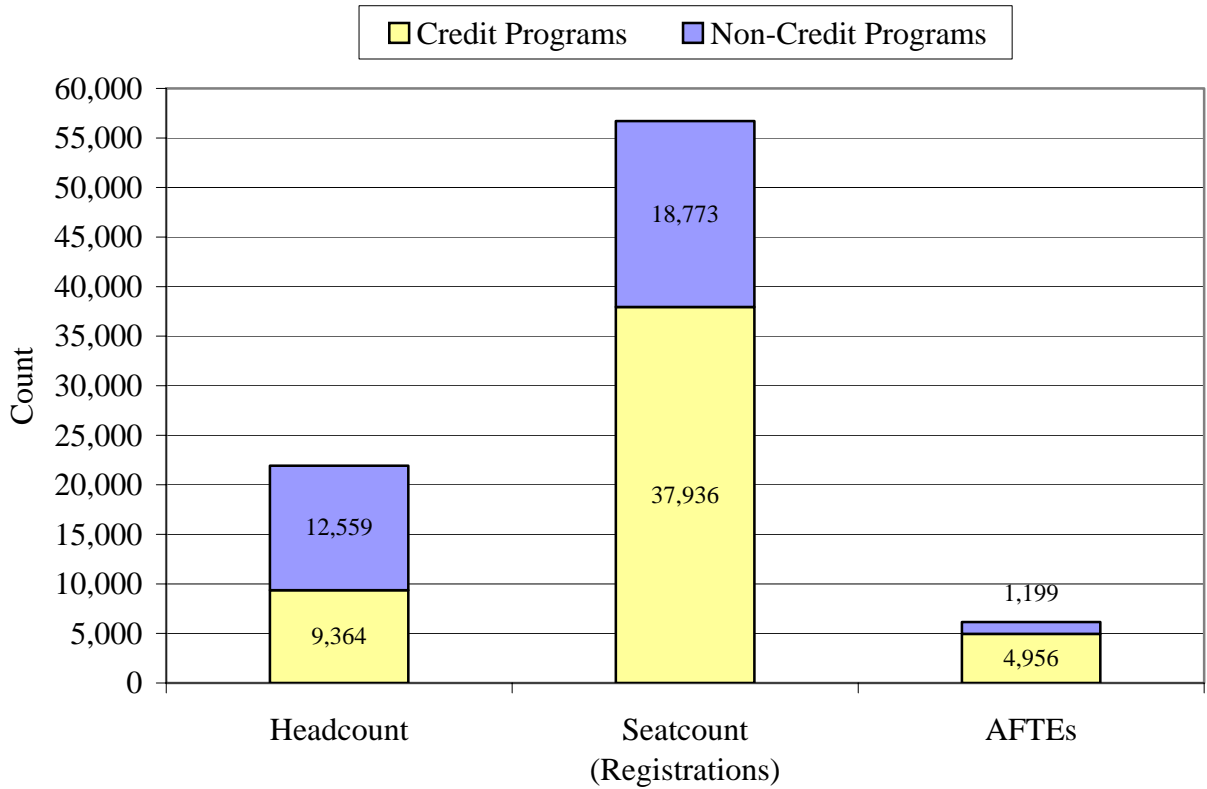

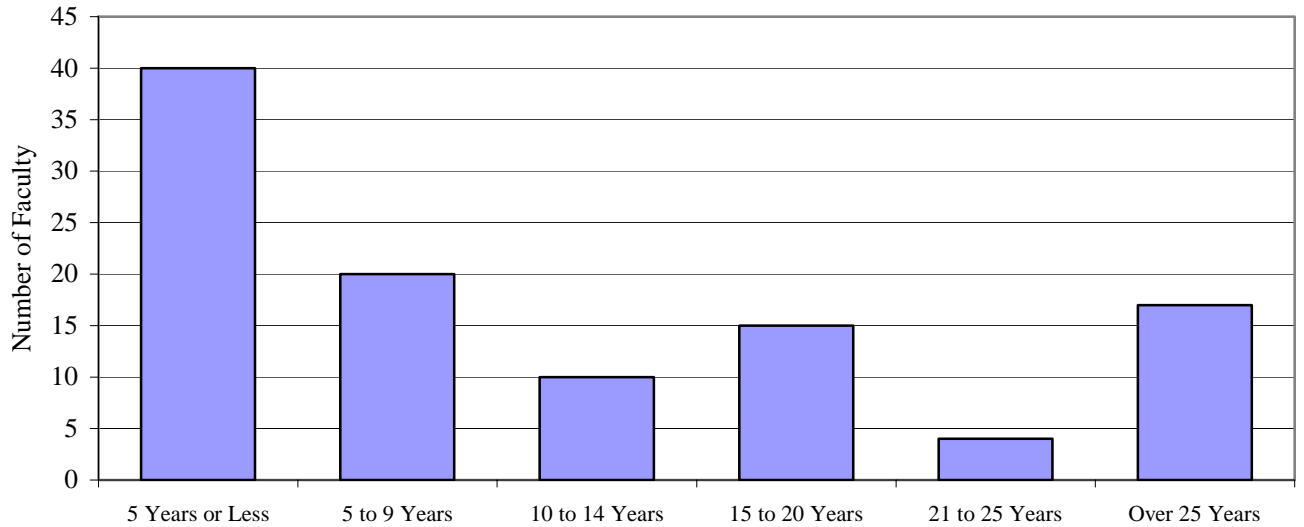

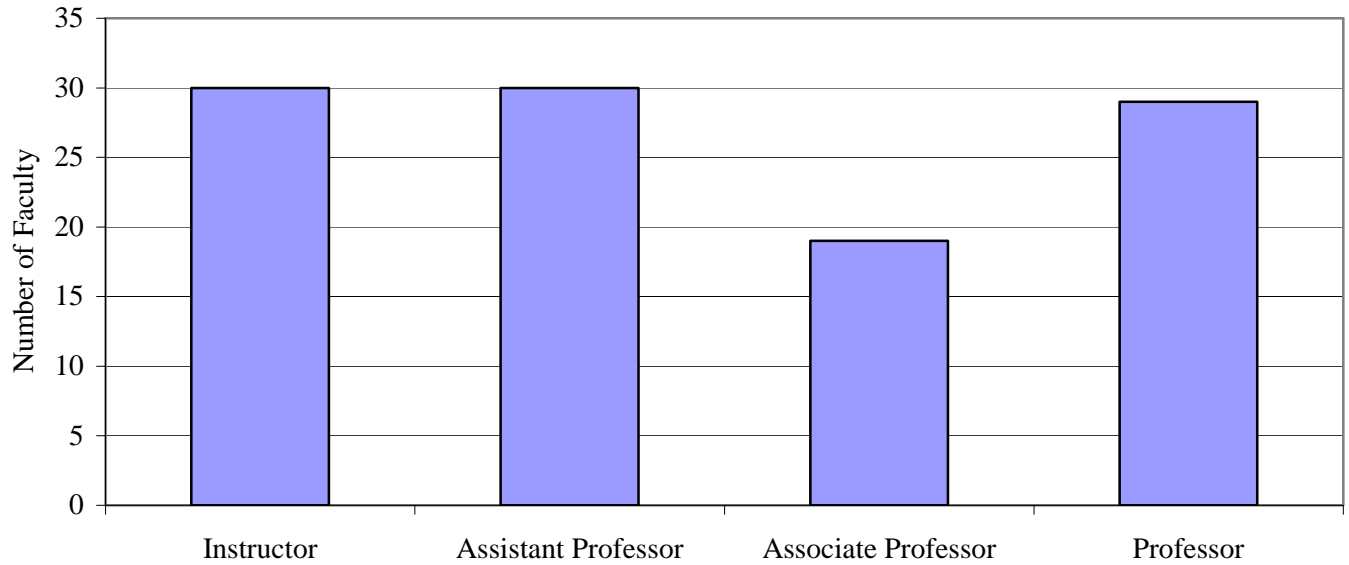

Students, faculty, and staff have remote access to virtually all library resources and services. Patrons can search the library catalog, renew their library materials, submit interlibrary loan requests, and conduct research from any of our databases. Non-college users may access any portion of the library website that does not require patron verification.
- Interlibrary loan borrowing privileges available from over 50,000 participating libraries. The college community can electronically request books, journal articles, and audiovisual materials from this worldwide cooperative.
